## **DESTINATION JOY** by Alberita Johnson, CL Minister



In thinking about the months of April and May and the fullness of spring, I realize they embody the spirit of hope. "I hope for the best." "I hope all is well with you." These are common phrases we've all heard and likely expressed ourselves at some time.

One of my past blogs called Positive Outcomes generated a few responses,

one of which was about hope. It triggered my thinking about the concept of hope. What is hope and does it have the same meaning for everyone?

Hope for many is a little flame that keeps them going. We can hope to get to work on time. We can hope to complete a project to satisfaction. We can hope to . . . fill in the blank.

For many other people, hope is seldom used; instead it is saved for serious problems. It is needed only in dire circumstances, for emergencies, or when they want or desire something with great anticipation.

But for me, hope is a raging fire that keeps me motivated. Hope is an anchor for me, one of my greatest and most used tools. It permits me to believe in myself when no one else does; it helps me to kill unhealthy fears; it allows me to complete tasks that seem too daunting to accomplish. Hope is that smooth stone that David used to kill Goliath.

I use hope all the time. I found out something about hope a long time ago; that is, one does not need to have a lot of it. Instead hope is something we have to have faith in. All we need is a little of it and we can do mighty things. Let's take a look at the common phrases mentioned earlier. "I hope for the best," or "I hope all is well with you." These are actually powerful phrases filled with encouragement for positive outcomes.

Positive outcomes are what I hope for you today: that you succeed, and that you always have joy and peace in your life. That you continue in a life of satisfaction, and that no hurt or harm comes your way. I want you to be fulfilled and to live a long healthy life, have a life of abundance. Do you have a dream, a goal you want to achieve? Then I want that for you too! That's hope in action, my hope for you.

The next time you hope, remember the power of HOPE. And feel free to add to it, maybe with a little love and with genuine sincerity.

Hey! I think hope is running past! I am reaching out and grabbing hold. Won't you join me and -- as Jesse Jackson said --"Keep Hope Alive!"?

The Board Meeting was held on Wednesday, April 17, 2024, at 1:00 p.m.

The usual things took place at the Board Meeting. The Treasurer gets asked detailed questions. We review the agenda. We were updated as to moving forward with parking lot improvements. We also discussed the need for reserving parking spaces for guest speakers and our minister (so she can find her way into her office for some quiet time before Sunday service).

We discussed the concept of "passive promotion" made possible by All Faiths excellent location on McGregor Boulevard. We voted to purchase an audio visual (AV) system, including a projector, cart and power bank. Regina donated a DVD/CD player to be made part of the AV system. All of this will hopefully relieve Regina from having to take time to set up all of the AV equipment.

We discussed the upcoming contract renewal for our Contracted Lay Minister. This will be accomplished over the next two months.

Rosalie Kuehn has agreed to succeed Fran Way as head of the Membership Committee. Dick Scudder will be assisting this team as the coordinator for Greeters.

Ed Elrod drew the winning ticket for the quilt on Sunday, April 21. The lucky winner was Christine Fisher. The board discussed the status of the additional nine quilts. Ed and Doug and Diane Cartwright have agreed that they will place the remaining quilts for sale on the internet.

We discussed use of our facility by outside groups, prompted by a request from some visitors and a Ukrainian Theater Group. More information is needed. This discussion also included membership in outside groups related to social action teams. Barb McFarlane noted the Heart for the Homeless Team used its budgeted moneys for an All Faiths membership in the Lee County Homeless Coalition. David Donovan asked about membership

for our Rainbow Connection Team in the Southwest Harmony Chamber. More info on this in the future.

Frank discussed the upcoming review of the Congregational Manual. He will be forming a small group to review all governing documents for consistency and then bring recommendations to the board and then to the congregation.

## LIFE News & Updates

#### Lee Interfaith for Empowerment

Three hundred network members and their guests attended LIFE's April 9th Nehemiah Action. Thank you to the 16 All Faiths network members who were among the crowd.

During LIFE's Mental Health Action Team research phase, they interviewed local mental health professionals and persons who have had interactions, either for themselves or for family members, with the mental health system. Both mental health providers and system users said that persons who are being admitted to a mental health facility using the Baker Act are often handcuffed which creates more trauma for a person who is already feeling stress.

Although Lee County Sheriff Department deputies routinely handcuff (and sometimes shackles) persons being transported for mental health treatment, the Fort Myers Police Department rarely uses restraints during transport. In the rare instances when restraint is used, the Fort Myers police officer is required to complete a form stating why restraint was necessary.

A review of both departments' policies revealed that Fort Myers' policy reflects the Baker Act's stipulation that persons being transported under the Act should not be restrained or treated like a criminal. The only exception is if the person is violent or a danger to themselves or others. The Sheriff Department's policy does not reflect those Baker Act requirements.

LIFE had invited Lee County Sheriff Carmine Marceno to attend the event. Because Sheriff Marceno had declined to attend but sent a representative instead, LIFE attendees signed post cards asking the Sheriff to change his department's policy to reflect the Baker Act requirements. The Sheriff's representative was asked to deliver the 300 cards to the Sheriff; the representative said he would do so.

Fort Myers Police Chief Jason Fields was also invited to the Nehemiah Action. LIFE presented Police Chief Fields a certificate of thanks for having and implementing a policy that reflects the Baker Act's intent to not criminalize a person seeking mental health treatment.

The Mental Health Research Team will continue to petition Sheriff Marceno for a meeting at which they will ask him to amend the Department's policy related to persons who are being transported (under the Baker Act) to a mental health facility. They also will ask Police Chief Fields for the opportunity to review his department's database where that tracks whether or not restraints were used during a Baker Act transport.

## **FOR THE HOMELESS NEWS**

We continue to learn of resources in the community that support people without housing. We will accept Terryn Baah-Acheamfour's offer to tour the Salvation Army's day program. More information on the date will be sent via email. Please join us in seeing how their services help people work toward more stable safe lives.

For some reason, the sign on our bike rack has disappeared twice. We will hold off on replacing, because the neighbors seem to know to leave bikes.

If you find an extra few hours a week or month on your hands....AND have an interest in fixing or learning how to repair bikes, please let me know. Mike's Bikes, associated with North Shore Alliance church ( where we bring the donated bikes), could use help. He's offered to teach anyone interested.

Insect repellents will be collected on Sunday, May 26. The outreach team suggests repentant with DEET, because it prevents jigger bites, but any small sized repellent is needed and useful for those sleeping outside. These will be delivered to outreach teams by Matt Wallace, Outreach Coordinator for the Lee County Homeless Coalition. He appreciated the large T-shirt collection in March, saying they've distributed most of them.

As always, feel free to stop at our casual monthly meeting to ask questions or bring ideas.

Revenue/Operating Income and Expenses for the **2023-2024 fiscal year** which ended on March 31, 2024:

- -All Faiths budgeted for pledge giving at \$203,509 in 2023-2024; but the amount actually pledged was \$183,268 (90%).
- As of 3/31/2024, \$178,250.79 (97.3%) of these pledges has been received.
- Total income exceeded total expenses. Overall, expenses were lower than budgeted primarily because there was a Minister vacancy for 5 months.
- The Board approved the consolidation of several accounts to streamline accounting and to further increase interest income. These changes were made before the end of March 2024 and are reflected in the figures listed above.

At the beginning of the 2023-2024 fiscal year, several new accounts were created at Live Oak to generate increased interest income. The 1-Year CD rate is 5.0%. And the Savings rate is currently at 4.0%.

The March monthly transfer/deposit of \$1,250 to the Live Oak Capital Reserve account was made. There were no Capital expenses in March. Repaving of the parking lot has not yet occurred.

In March, \$1,840 was collected for Operation Joy.

As we enter the new **2024-2025 fiscal year** on April 1, All Faiths budgeted \$200,200 for pledge giving; to date, actual pledges have totaled \$182,860 (91.3%).

## QUALIFIED VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR FINANCIAL REVIEW



All Faiths is looking for three people to help with our Annual Financial Review. A review of our financial records and accounting practices is required under All Faiths' Bylaws after our books are closed for the last fiscal year.

Ed Kleinow had graciously

volunteered to lead this team for many years, and for that, we extend our deepest gratitude.

This is a review, not an audit, but knowledge of bookkeeping, accounting and/or financial experience would be helpful. Prior financial review reports and very detailed guidelines are available for conducting the review so we won't be reinventing the wheel.

This is a once-a-year short-term commitment. The review typically takes two or three days to complete.

## **THE RAINBOW CONNECTION!**

As another Earth Day celebration passes, your Climate Action Team continues to look for ways to be more effectual and to having a broader reach into our community. The climate change clock keeps ticking and reminding us that what we do today will profoundly impact the kind of world we live in tomorrow.

At our meeting in April, we discussed a sales call Joan had received from a company called Palmetto Solar that was promoting a "no cost" installation of leased solar panels. According to the sales pitch, this "no upfront cost solar system" would save the homeowner about a third of the cost of energy from FP&L. All Faiths had explored installing solar and found the upfront cost prohibitive. Perhaps this was an alternative. Bob Moore confirmed that leasing is an option in Florida. Here's what he said:

- "It's one of 3 options:
- 1) Buy outright.
- 2) Finance through a loan
- 3) Lease from a 3rd party.

Generally options 1 and 2 have more benefits to homeowners. If you can afford it, option 1 has the greatest benefit. If not, financing can allow you to own the system and usually pay it off with monthly payments that are similar or less than your current electric bill. Leasing is usually the least beneficial to the homeowner. Even though the monthly payments may be less than the electric bill, they extend for a long time. So the total cost is high. You also don't own the system when you go to sell your house. So you need to know the terms of the lease for that." If you have not yet considered solar for your home or business, we encourage you to investigate these options.

There is a great deal of discussion taking place among the various Climate Action Team partner groups about finding ways to function more collaboratively in order to have more impact. Climate change is not just an environmental issue; it will affect all aspects of our economy and strongly impact social justice issues. The groups are exploring ways to help organize a climate solutions consortium that can bring multiple groups together in shared goals and actions. We look to you for your help in this process. Please let us know about any connections you may have with business or organizational leaders, so we can reach out to them and engage their support for our efforts. Together, we can make a difference. The Rainbow Connection has been very busy these past couple of months. Several of us attended a social mixer in downtown Fort Myers, sponsored by the SW Florida Harmony Chamber of Commerce. The Chamber is an LGBTQ organization whose mission is to promote professional networking within the greater Fort Myers LGBTQ community, as well as to promote outreach within the community. At the event, we met with members from other organizations and Board members from the Harmony Chamber, as well as the Director of the Board for Visuality. We introduced ourselves and gave a brief description of who we are and what we do as a congregation.

In talking with Visuality, we agreed to set up a meeting at their location to review their operation and explore where we had a mutual interest in supporting each other. This is the start of the last element of the FIVE PRACTICES of a WELCOMING CONGREGATION – Support a Welcoming Project. Visuality is a non-profit organization with a mission to enhance and sustain the health and well-being of the LGBTQ+ community and their allies in SWFL through peer support, education, and empowerment programming. This includes programs for LGBTQ+ youth, the trans community, adults, and seniors.

We made a request to join the Harmony Chamber at the All Faiths Board meeting in April and got approval. That same week, we officially became a member. This relationship will provide networking opportunities with local businesses and organizations to promote the work that All Faiths does in the community and potentially attract new members. We also expressed an interest with the Harmony Chamber Board in hosting a similar mixer event in the future to showcase our organization and mission.


The Rainbow Connection is currently working on getting ready to represent All Faiths at the Naples Pride Event on June 8th.
