BOARD NOTES by Frank Geltner, Board Chair

The Board meeting was held on November 20, 2024, at 1:00 p.m.

Hopefully you all had a wonderful Thanksgiving and are now getting ready for the Christmas holidays. Regina and her team of Merry Elves will have decorated the Sanctuary and Community Room. We take this time of the year to count our blessings and begin thinking into the new year.

Diane Chernow has had to resign from the Board of Directors for health reasons. We wish her well. Barb McFarlane agreed to be nominated and was elected to serve as Secretary for the remainder of the year.

We will be having a workshop on the Congregational Manual on Thursday, January 9. Any member of the congregation is welcome to join the board for this discussion. The next meeting of the Bylaws Review Committee is Monday, November 25 at Noon.

Dan DeShon has agreed to serve as adviser to Building and Grounds Team for our landscaping.

Fran Way's son, Bobby Way, has agreed to serve as consultant on our Audio/Technical system.

A Social Justice Coordinating Team is engaged in a pilot program to sort out how best to organize its efforts for both the internal communications between Social Justice Teams and external outreach.

The board gave the green light to Brian Bigelow to bring an estimate to build a cedar screen behind the Memorial Garden for both aesthetic and practical purposes, i.e., to screen the storage behind the Memorial Garden and dedicate a space for storage.

I met with Dan DeShon and Brian Bigelow to discuss the grounds maintenance. Dan has been working at the Edison Ford Estates and will bring his expertise to bear on All Faiths needs. We have quite a few overgrown trees and shrubbery needing cutting. As a Green Sanctuary we seek to populate our grounds with native species. We also work towards lower maintenance strategies. Brian has agreed to build a cedar fence behind the Memorial Garden to screen off the storage area.

This, and other improvements will require some volunteer time from members. We will make an announcement when the time comes. Marge and Bob will be finding some solar lights to both illuminate our damaged sign and provide some light for those seeking our facility after dark.

John continues to pursue bids for replacing the fence and sign.

The next board meeting is Wednesday, December 18 at 1:00 p.m.

Beloveds,

As I sat down to write this article, I found myself returning to the election results of 2024. Immediately the roller coaster of emotions filled my cup, spilled over the top and I started wondering what tomorrow will be like in this country. I began to compare the history of this country to stories we are now not only writing but living. Unfor-

tunately it appears that it is a story of backsliding. But is it true or are my fears guiding my thoughts?

My story is not new, I was born during the latter part of the boomer generation and now sixty years later it feels as if we choose to turn back. For some it is nostalgia and they are filled with wistful affection while others are filled with regret. As fear and a relapse to bad and erroneous ways of Being that many of our parents, and friends fought against.

They protested for peace, freedom from tyranny, and freedom of choice. And now here we go again. I, and hundreds perhaps thousands more are trying to comprehend how we could be going backwards, how could this be happening in the twenty first century within a capitalist and democratic nation.

This nation is still a young nation compared to our European neighbors and others across the pond. I deeply believe that we can learn from their history so we do not have to repeat it here. Then I remember and come to a full stop.

Perhaps we this nation have not learned enough as evident in Hungary, and India. These nations are backsliders, and have become Electoral Autocracies. Hybrid Regimes are one in which democratic institutions are imitative and adhere to authoritarian methods. In these regimes, regular elections are held, but they are accused of failing to reach democratic standards of freedom and fairness. Sounds Familiar right?

This became close to home, since the advent of the Republican Tea Party Movement of the twenty first century formed in opposition to the Presidency of Barack Obama. And their platform continues to be prevalent within the current Republican Party.

None of us know what will happen, or where this nation is headed, but if the writing on the wall is correct, our beloved nation is headed for dramatic change from a great leading nation to one of isolation and authoritarian rule. The lines are being drawn, where will you stand? As Unitarian Universalists we know we stand on the side of love. We lean into our values that reflect our ways of Being.

Until then, let us gracefully embrace the holiday season with Joy and Gratitude as we gather with family and friends. May you be safe, healthy, and filled with Joy! Amen and Ashe.

CELEBRATE HANNUUKAH & KWAANZA

Sunday, December 29, 2024 - 3:00 - 5:00 P.M. Congregational Fried Food Potluck



There are some foods you're almost certain to encounter at a Hanukkah dinner: fried shredded potato pancakes known as latkes, fried pastries, fried fish, and even fried chicken. Noticing a pattern? These de-

licious treats all get the deep-fried treatment. This contrasts with the Jewish high holiday menus for Yom Kippur or Rosh Hashanah, which often have brisket, fresh fruit like apples and pomegranates, and non-fried fish such as lox. So what gives with all of the fried goodness at Hanukkah?

That goes back to the actual story of Hanukkah, the festival of lights, which celebrates a miracle that occurred over 2,000 years ago. After ousting an oppressive king, Jewish rebels recovered a religiously significant temple. According to the Talmud, when they went to light the menorah as part of the rededication, they realized there was only enough oil to keep the flame lit for a single night. But the flame didn't go out and lasted for a total of eight days and nights, which gave them time to find more oil. That's why the festival of lights is just as much a celebration of oil.



Each year as the calendar winds down, the holiday of Kwanzaa is just beginning. Honoring African American culture and heritage, Kwanzaa is a week-long celebration ob-

served from December 26 though January 1. It's seven days marked by family and community gatherings, lighting symbolic candles, and sharing delicious food. Dating back to 1966, the holiday serves as more than a festive get-together; it's an important signifier of Black identity and unity in America.

African American identity according to the holiday's creator, Professor Maulana Karenga. Each of the principles, such as self-determination, creativity, and faith, is represented by a candle on a seven-branched candleholder called a kinara. Based in part on African harvest traditions, the holiday culminates with a large, communal feast called Karamu.

Though the word Kwanzaa roughly translates to "first fruits of the harvest," the holiday's menu varies. Traditional American soul food dishes – like mac and cheese, collard greens, and fried catfish, to name a few – are every bit at home on the Kwanzaa table as foods inspired by the African harvest season.

October 2024 Profit & Loss

Revenue/Operating Income and Expenses:

As we entered the new 2024-2025 fiscal year on April 1, All Faiths budgeted \$200,200 for pledge giving; to date, actual pledges have totaled \$185,160 (92.5%).

Our Pledge Goal for the months of April to October was \$116,785.00; and \$92,286.38 was received (79.0%). However, before April 1, 2024, \$24,757.01 was received in paid pledges towards the new year. Taking this into account, we have received a total of \$117,043.39 towards the current year total pledge drive goal of \$200,200 (58.5%).

No unusual expenses incurred in the General Fund Operating Account during October.

At the beginning of the 2023-2024 fiscal year, several new accounts were created at Live Oak to generate increased interest income. The 1 Year CD rate is 5.0%. And the Savings rate is currently at 3.8%.

The October monthly transfer/deposit of \$1,530.00 to the Live Oak Capital Reserve account was made. In October, the new side door was paid for at a total cost of \$2,560.00, and funding was from Capital Reserves.

In October, \$761.00 was collected for the St. Matthew's House Shelter (Heart for the Homeless Team). In addition, \$1,415 was collected for the UUA Disaster Relief Fund and All Faiths contributed an additional \$5,000 from Reserves to pay back the generosity of the UUA Disaster Relief Fund after Hurricane Ian.






